Activity! Paper House

Supplies: 1 piece of paper Crayons, Markers or Colored Pencils Scissors

Fold each side of the paper in to meet the middle.

Cut a triangle on the top for a roof. Color your house, drawing a door, windows, etc. Have a grown-up help you cut the door and windows if you want.

Draw your family on the inside!

Literacy Tip: Talk to your child about the shapes that you see in the "Paper House" activity. (Triangle roof, square window, rectangle door, etc.)

Why Are Shapes Important?: Learning to tell one letter from another involves being able to see the differences in letter shapes. Helping children learn about different shapes and to understand how things are alike and different will help prepare them to learn the alphabet.
